



AWARDS



ONE IS A COMPETITIVE AWARD, BASED ON POINTS ACCUMULATED AND THE OTHER IS A PARTICIPATION AWARD, BASED ON AN OUTSTANDING LEVEL OF PARTICIPATION. BOTH AWARDS ARE TO BE GIVEN OUT AFTER OUR ANNUAL FLOWER AND VEGETABLE SHOW, THEREBY CREATING A YEAR'S WORTH OF EXHIBITING FROM SEPTEMBER OF THE FIRST YEAR TO AUGUST OF THE SECOND YEAR, INCLUSIVE. NAME PLATES WILL BE ENGRAVED BY THE MADAWASKA VALLEY HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY.

THE "EXHIBITOR OF THE YEAR" MARG AND STAN SUTER AWARD:

THIS AWARD WAS FIRST GIVEN OUT IN 1997. IT IS GIVEN TO THE PERSON WHO HAS ACCUMULATED THE MOST POINTS THROUGHOUT THE YEAR, IN OUR MONTHLY COMPETITIONS AND IN THE ANNUAL FLOWER AND VEGETABLE SHOW, HELD IN AUGUST. AS PER MARG AND STAN'S DESIRE, THIS TROPHY CAN ONLY BE WON ONCE. IN THE CASE WHERE THE SAME PERSON IS ELIGIBLE TO WIN IT A SECOND TIME, THE TROPHY WILL BE AWARDED TO THE NEXT PARTICIPANT WHO HAS NOT WON PREVIOUSLY.

THE "JOAN KYDD MEMORIAL AWARD"

THIS AWARD WAS ESTABLISHED TO PROMOTE PARTICIPATION IN THE MONTHLY AND ANNUAL COMPETITIONS. IT IS BASED ON PARTICIPATION LEVEL, NOT ON THE POINTS ACCUMULATED THROUGHOUT THE YEAR. 

Kelly Wallace, founder of Think Turtle Conservation Initiative will give a talk about the perils Ontario turtles face on and off the roads, what we can do to effectively help the turtles, and what resources are available to do so.

Design is in one container or containers combined so as to appear as one unit. (from Ontario Judging and Exhibiting Standards)

AUGUST 15

FILM: Modified: A Food Lover's Journey into GMOs

In this award-winning documentary, the filmmaker and her mother embark on a personal and poignant investigative journey to find out why genetically modified organisms (GMOs) are not labeled on food products in the United States and Canada, despite being labeled in 64 countries around the world. Shot over a span of ten years, the film explores the impacts of genetically engineering our food, exposing the cozy relationship



between the agribusiness industry and our governments. The film is anchored in the intimate story of the filmmaker's relationship to her mom, an organic gardener, seed saver, and food activist who battled cancer while the film's production was underway.
