



YEARBOOK PHOTO CONTEST







SPEAKER: Donna Marie Cybulskie

TOPIC: Winter Sowing

A couple of years ago, Donna Marie Cybulskie from Killaloe retired after a 35-year career as a school counsellor. From the age of 13 one of her favourite pastimes has been gardening. Over the years she has learned how to collect and save many of her own seeds, starting them mostly indoors in early spring. As her stashes of seeds grew, her space indoors for starting plants did not, so she started to research alternatives. This is when she discovered "winter sowing" and she's never looked back. Why just garden in spring/summer when you can successfully start seeds outdoors in containers in -20 C weather? You get to have a head start on gardening, have no indoor mess, no damping off, and there are never any issues with flies and gnats. Donna warns that this way of starting seeds that she will describe can become addictive.

House Plant Exchange:

Tonight is also House Plant Exchange, 7:00-7:30 pm! Just like our fall Seed Exchange, tonight you can bring what you like and take away what you want. It's not necessary to bring a plant in order to take a plant, "Take me, I'm yours!". Please ensure they're healthy, and transport them within a covered container or bag to protect from the cold. TOPIC: Starting Seeds

This month we are tapping into the expertise of two of our board members who are savvy seed starters.



Stephanie is a vegetable and herb gardener and hopes to inspire and educate you to start your own seedlings. She will share the methods that she uses to start her easy no-till, no-dig garden and greenhouse. Her talk will focus on starting and transplanting seedlings, multi-sowing to ensure successful harvests, her fine-tuned sowing calendar and

also how to keep those voracious garden pests at bay (yes, her garden is next to a groundhog hole!).



Georgie has been gardening for 35+ years and continues to learn/discover new things every season. She has been propagating her own vegetables since 2018. She will show how she starts her seeds using recycled and repurposed materials that are readily available.

SPEAKER: Trish Murphy,

Beaux Arbres Native Plants

TOPIC: Native Plant Gardening

Trish Murphy has been interested in native plants and gardening since she was a child. She served on the Board of the North American Native Plant Society from 1999 to 2003 and ran their big annual plant sale, in the course of which she met many of the growers and suppliers of native plants. When she moved to the Ottawa Valley in 2013, she immediately started growing plants for her own landscaping, and selling the surplus. This evolved into Beaux Arbres Native Plants, in Bristol, Quebec. In the fall of 2023, she started moving the nursery operation to Eganville (1456 Grist Rd), and hopes to be open for business in May 2024. Trish will explain what we mean by "native," why native plants are important for wildlife, and how to use them in our gardens.

SPEAKER: Zach Loeks

Ecosystem Solution Institute

TOPIC: Edible Ecosystem Design

Zach Loeks grew up on a permaculture homestead outside Santa Fe, New Mexico. He started an organic market garden in Ontario, serving over 300 community supported vegetable baskets for over a decade, and is a three-time award winning grower. He is the innovator of "edible ecosystem design," a unique system for organized biodiverse land management. He works as a designer of edible ecosystems, including helping to find and fund education sites, in community green spaces, farms and homesteads. He teaches widely on the subject through schools, conferences and hands-on workshops. He has published three books and is working on his fourth. Zach now divides his time between Winnipeg and his farm near Micksburg (south of Pembroke). Zach will tell us about his innovative techniques to create hardy, productive, edible perennial ecosystems, also known as edible forest gardens.





SPEAKER: Doug DeLaMatter

TOPIC: Nature and Garden Photography

After a lifetime of snapping photos using film, and a career as a science teacher, Doug DeLaMatter has been taking pictures more seriously, ever since he got his first digital camera almost 20 years ago. Living in the Madawaska Valley provides him endless opportunities to capture beautiful images of nature. He believes we need to be reminded of nature's beauty and fragility, and to do what we can to "tread lightly" within our environment. Doug's presentation will include a brief overview of the mechanics of photography, but will spend more time on the elements of composition and how to simplify the process of getting impactful images, especially of flowers. He will share some "tricks of the trade" on how to create memorable photos. He will also discuss how to effectively use smart phones for photography.



TOPIC Invasive Plants

Connie Matthews-Cull has been an avid gardener for 35 years. She maintained a city garden in Ottawa, and a country garden simultaneously for 15 years. Now retired from teaching, she spends all her waking hours in her garden in Douglas, or on the computer as President of the Eganville and Area Horticultural Society and as Assistant Director of District 2 of the Ontario Horticultural Association. 

Prolonging the Life of Cut Flowers

To prevent (or slow down) bacterial growth in the water:

Add 1tsp. household bleach (yes! bleach!) to approx. 2 litres of water.

When refreshing the water, dump all the water out, and replace with new water prepared as above.

Environmentally Friendly 'Holding Material' for Flower and Greenery Arrangements

Instead of using 'oasis foam', try using chicken wire stuffed with moss. Pour a little water in to keep the moss nicely moist. This holds the product extremely well, and can be used over and over again.

Seed Bombs, Spread the Native Plants



Here is the recipe: 3 parts compost material, 2 parts dry clay (for the clay, non-clumping kitty litter can be used or subsoil clay from your yard), a sprinkling of local milkweed seed (about 1/5 of a part)

Method: Mix all ingredients well while dry then add just enough water to form a ball. Divide this mixture into smaller balls and allow these to dry for a few days. Now you are ready to go!

Where do you put these milkweed seed bombs?

In or on your garden, toss them on an abandoned field (with permission).

When do you plant?

Fall: after a few frosts so seeds do not start to germinate.

Winter: while snow is on the ground so that seeds will cold stratify before spring arrives.

Spring: after the frost has passed

How do you plant the bombs?

Toss them on the ground. They do not need to be planted in soil. With a little water, compost and sunlight, the bombs will begin to germinate.

Note: Bombs can be made with many native seeds so instead of only making milkweed bombs, try Joe-Pye Weed and other wildflower seeds.

- 5. Special events – workshops, seminars, courses, District AGM, OHA convention hosting, etc.
- 6. Yearbook, Newsletter, website - planning, developing and maintaining.
- 7. Executive meetings - attending executive meetings. Include set-up and planning of regular meetings (not time during regular meetings).
- 8. Executive members – President, V.P., Secretary, Treasurer, Social Convener, etc.
- 9. Other - breakdown of other activities not covered above (fundraising, Trivia Night, etc.)
