Flower Show Rules, Tips and Prizes

These apply to all PD & WHS competitions and flower shows, including the October Joint meeting.

Definitions:

See OJES (Ontario Judging and Exhibiting Standards Book) available at monthly meetings.

Flower Show Rules:

- All exhibitors must be current members of the Society; memberships may be purchased at the door.
- Design classes: fresh plant material can be from any source and must be included. Fruits, vegetables, branches, and decorative wood may be used and or dried or treated material may be included. The use of artificial plant material is forbidden.
- Buds showing colour will count as a bloom.
- "Specimens with own foliage": ONLY attached foliage should be shown in a cut flower exhibit.
- If more than one entry is allowed in a class, they must be different
- cultivars.
- Potted plants must have been container grown and in the exhibitor's possession for at least 3 months.
- Judging will be in accordance with Ontario Judging & Exhibiting Standards Book, (OJES 2019). If there is a conflict, the schedule rules.
- All Ontario designated invasive plants should be avoided; the schedule will specify which specific local species are currently forbidden in both horticultural and design exhibits.

Photography Competition Rules:

- Photo prints not to be larger than 5" x 7".
- Photos to be on photographic paper, unframed, unmatted, unless otherwise specified; prints with small borders are acceptable.
- Judging scale: Horticulture value 40%, Photographic value 40%, General impact 20%

Flower Show Tips:

- Design and Photography class titles are meant to inspire interpretation, not dictate content.
- **Groom** all specimens and potted plants: free of dust, pests, spent blooms and leaves.
- Containers, to be provided by the exhibitor, should be clean and not foil-covered; staging is important.
- There should be a well-proportioned relationship between plant and container

- Size, colour and shape, and correct number as specified are important.
- May use a wedge or Kenzan (OJES p. 143) to hold specimen in place.
- Entrants are encouraged to label entries with the botanical and common name to enhance educational value of the show.
- Entry tags will be available at each show at set-up time

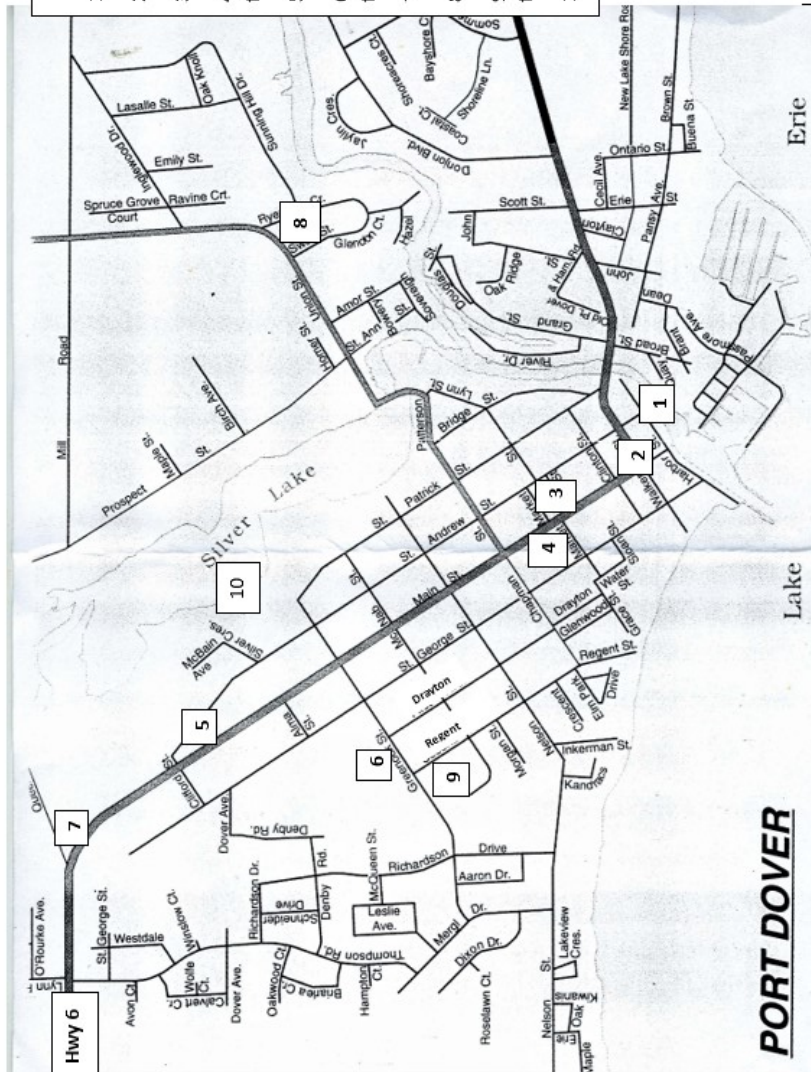
