DAY TRIPPING by Marilyn Rawson

With warmer spring and summer weather, it is a good time to get out and enjoy the beautiful gardens, whether local or afar. Sarnia has some beautiful parks and gardens. Germain Park is often considered a hidden gem. Enjoy our own park on College Avenue. Wander downriver and visit Greenhill Gardens on Wilkesport Line. If travelling further south, visit Dieppe Park at the Windsor waterfront. If your day outing is to the London area, visit Springbank Park or travel to St. Thomas to see the elevated gardens (former railroad bridge). Whistling Gardens in Wilsonville is worth a visit. See the musical water show. The gardens have the largest public peony and conifer collection in North America (see peonies in May/ June). If venturing further afield, visit the Royal Botanical Gardens in Hamilton. If in the Niagara area, wander through Niagara Parks Gardens on the parkway. Visit the arboretum in Guelph adjacent to the University of Guelph. A trip to Stratford is worthwhile to see the Arthur Meghan gardens at Upper Queens Park at the festival site. Stop in Fergus to view the Temple Gardens along the riverside.



Riverbend Gardens are located at 43846 C Line in Wroxeter. Stop at garden centres in your travels this spring and summer. There are also many great garden tours to enjoy on Youtube.
