Member Report: Our garden journey, and what our garden is to me

In October of 2019 we moved to Winona (Lake Pointe really) from Northwest Mississauga. We went "all in" on our front yard garden in the fall of 2020 - we took about 1/3 of the lawn and had it replaced with a pollinator garden.



We incorporated over 20 different plants, including New England Asters, Anise Hyssops, Big Bluestems, coneflowers and Black eyed Susans. Over the years we have added more native plants including Northern Bush Honeysuckle, Columbines and Swamp Milkweed, and swapped some plants out.



So what does the garden mean to us?

In the **spring**, it is all about hope and growth, beauty and intrigue. We walk around during the spring months oohing and aahing at nature springing to life. Later we trim back the old growth - leaving it long enough that if there are any native bees in the stems they have had a chance to leave - ten days of at least 10 degrees during the day.

It is also time to put out our solitary bee hotels - the cocoons have been hibernating in the fridge over the winter. I feel pride and happiness at being able to play some small part in helping these little insects out. It is cool to see parts cut out of some of the leaves by the leafcutter bees.

In the **late spring and summer**, we get to see the bees buzzing around; butterflies too – lots of them. They love the Hyssops, Sage, Cardinal Flowers, Black Eyed Susan and sunflowers in particular. I will sometimes just sit while weeding or deadheading and watch them.

We have water bowls in a number of spots in the garden, and a bird bath. It is amazing to see how much activity they generate - spotting a creature getting a "slurp" always makes me smile.

In **late summer and early fall** the New England Asters come out in all their glory – they are far and away the flowers that get the most questions from passers by. They look almost electric in their colour! Many of the other flowers start to die back, but some still have blooms. And – the birds are in full force at the seed heads.





In the Winter, the interest level in the full garden is still there too – the textures of the plants (not cut back) gives a wonderful look, and seed heads help feed the birds for quite a while. We also put our bird feeders out – got to do our part to help them get through the winter.

We engage with folks out for walks, meet their dogs and kids, answer their questions. We are a National Wildlife and Canadian Wildlife "Certified Wildlife Habitat", a "Pollinator Pathway" yard, and we hope a home for lots of earth's creatures. Watching birds, butterflies, bees and bunnies, active in the yard; seeing the neighbourhood kids dance on the stepping stones, watching the growth as it happens it is all balm for the soul.



So – what is the garden to me? A place to smile, to embrace and help nature, to give back a bit, to sooth my soul and to calm my mind. And it never fails to do so.

Planting perennial seeds in fall

There are some perennial seeds that can be planted in the fall to sprout the following spring. Purple coneflower is a great example of a perennial seed that does well when sown in fall. In cold-winter areas, plant seeds at the depth given on the package

instructions after a killing frost but before the around freezes.

The goal for planting in fall is not to have your seeds germinate but to give them a period of stratification, or exposing them to cold and moist conditions. The alternating freeze and thaw of winter helps break down the seed coat and starts the growing process. Not all perennials do well with this technique, though. Check the list below for seeds you can sow in fall.

Perennial seeds to plant in fall

- Black-eyed Susan Rudbeckia fulgida
- **Delphinium** Delphinium elatum
- **Lupine** *Lupinus* spp. and hybrids
- **Oriental poppy** Papaver orientale
- **Penstemon** Penstemon spp. and hybrids
- **Perennial geranium** *Geranium* spp. and hybrids
- **Perennial sunflower** *Helianthus* spp. and hybrids
- Pincushion flower Scabiosa spp. and hybrids
- Prairie coneflower Ratibida spp.
- Purple coneflower Echinacea purpurea
- Wild columbine Aquilegia canadensis
