Also scheduled, were two very productive Spring and Fall cleanup campaigns. We did lose our Centennial Flowing Crabapple Tree but it has recently been replaced thanks to a generous donation from DeGroots Nursery. We had some recent problems with squatters in the garden and that has been remedied for now.

Four members of the Board were pleased to attend District 11 Spring and Fall Advisory Meetings

The Board has approved the creation of an endowment received from the generous donation of a deceased longtime member. Also approved, the interest will go towards purchasing trees for city parks. This will be reviewed after five years.

Our Garden's New Crab Apple Tree

On July 20 a line of violent storms moved quickly across southern Ontario and arrived in Sarnia about 4:00 p.m. The storm didn't last long but was exceedingly violent. Many trees were snapped and uprooted and power lines were damaged. The cleanup continued for weeks. One of the trees uprooted was the large crabapple at the centre of the society's garden at 231 College Ave. North. City workers arrived several days later and removed the tree, then the roots.

The original tree was a Royalty crabapple, planted 60 years ago. A modern version that is more disease-resistant is the Robinson crabapple. DeGroots Nursery knew of our loss and on October 26, Jeff Baarschers planted a young Robinson for us. Here he is proudly standing beside the newly planted tree. Thank you, Jeff, and DeGroots for this wonderful addition to our garden."





WINTER IN THE GARDEN — Marilyn Rawson

The cold weather may curb our enthusiasm for the outdoors but there is still pleasure in the landscape.

- Remember to care for the wildlife by putting out feeders with seeds and suet and dried corn for squirrels and chipmunks.
- Enjoy birdwatching. Evergreens provide beauty in all seasons and they shelter birds and animals.
- Berry bushes, seed heads of plants and grasses provide colour and beauty as well as food for birds and animals.
- Buy a heated birdbath.
- Care for and enjoy your indoor plants. There are many colourful plants including cyclamens, poinsettia, Christmas cactus, amaryllis and paperwhite narcissus.
- Decorate outside containers with evergreens, pinecones, birch twigs, colourful balls and ribbon.
- Make ice luminaries.
- Light up the night by stringing lights and lanterns. Solar lights are great!
- Enjoy your patio in winter with an outdoor heater and use of a firepit.
- Install a weather station.
- Do maintenance work on your pathways. Organize your garden shed and sharpen tools.
- Do winter composting.
- Put out wreaths and ornaments.
- Start planning your gardens by viewing catalogs and garden books. Order seeds and summer bulbs.
- Last but not least, photograph nature's beauty of your winter garden.

This year **Winter Solstice** will be December 21st .The definition of "solstice" is when the Earth's poles reach maximum tilt from the sun. This is the shortest day of light in the Northern Hemisphere. Celebrations have honored the symbols of fire and light along with life and death.

The **Farmer's Almanac** predicts a colder winter than normal for Southern Ontario. There will be above normal precipitation and snowfall. Colder periods will be late December early January and early to mid February. Snowiest weather will be mid to late December and early to mid January.
