CUCUMBER TREE PARIS

About 10 – 15 years ago, Society members were invited to view a Cucumber tree on Washington Street that was in danger due to its proximity to new home construction. At that time Harold and Mary Ellen Edgar were PHS Co-Presidents. Harold gathered some slips that were growing nearby and planted them on their property. He planted them very close to a larger tree to avoid running over the seedlings with the lawn mower. The seedlings have survived and grown. They needed to be moved due to their proximity to the larger tree.

Dave Collins and Doug Hanna were able to dig up the new saplings and they have been given to the county for planting in a suitable spot. **BUT** just before I was finalizing this newsletter, I found out that the trees were not cucumber trees but Ash trees. How disappointing.

The Cucumber tree is named for the resemblance of its fruit to the cucumber. It is the only native Magnolia species occurring in Canada. It is listed as endangered due to deforestation and loss of habitat. Threatened by forest clearing, its populations here in Ontario are isolated, making cross pollination and seed dispersal difficult. Thank you to Harold, Dave and Doug for digging up the trees. They are now all refreshing their knowledge on how to recognize a Cucumber Tree.

REMOVING POLLEN FROM YOUR CLOTHING

(from Brantford Garden Club, the Daffodil, June 2020

In the heart of their flowers, lilies have large anthers covered with dusty reddish gold pollen that can stick on and stain clothing, tablecloths and upholstery. Some people clip the anthers from the flower for this reason. Others think this makes the flower look unnatural and prefer to leave the anthers and deal with the pollen. If treated quickly and correctly, wayward pollen is quite easy to remove.

- 1. Do not brush the pollen off fabric with your hands; oils from your skin will set the stain.
- 2. Also, do not dab with water or a moistened cloth; this will spread and set the stain.
- 3. Let the pollen "dry", then carefully brush it away with a dry, soft brush or facial tissue.
- 4. Sticky tape also works well; gently dab pieces of tape on the cloth until the pollen is gone.
- 5. If some pollen remains after completing these procedures, place the item in direct sunlight for a few hours; the stain should "magically" disappear.
