WINTERBERRY:

The colour **Red** is the best of cures to stimulate and excite us on dreary grey days. Plan now to put the colour in your landscape with the bright red berries of the **Winterberry** that also lures in those colourful birds that feed on them. Enjoyed by over 40 species of birds, the berries remain throughout the winter season. In addition, they are a favourite for florists and DIY designers, utilizing them in arrangements and urns.

Ilex verticillata, is our native holly, but unlike the familiar holly shrubs, this is a deciduous shrub that loses its leaves in the fall revealing the stunning scarlet berries. It is also dioecious (separate male and female plants). They can be purchased locally but to ensure you have fertilized flowers that produce the berries, you must plant a male within 50 feet from the females (5-7 females). Groupings of these shrubs will grab your attention when seen along ponds and streams and in swamps or your side yard. They are easily grown in medium to wet soils in full sun to partial shade.

Order your shrubs now for spring planting and they will soon be enlivening your winter entertaining outdoors.





...and Irene's follow up message:

I took the picture November 23rd, with the snow to provide contrast. Lots of these shrubs are on swampy roadsides where you might need waders and the secret locations may not be readily shared, but you will spot them once you start paying attention. They look so colourful that I even tuck the berried branches into other bushes for impact. I was going to check with Proven Winners about getting three females and one male, priced around \$20 each. I'd love to plant them around a swampy area on the far end of our orchard but close to the road so still enjoyed. Plan ahead.

OUT AND IN DECEMBER 2020

Have you been out in your garden lately, looking around at what is and is not growing? Yes, growing and the plants preparing for next year. The buds are showing on the Lilac bushes and Magnolia trees, and this is normal. Even the Hostas are showing new sprouts. But what about what is in flower? We have been looking - and found buds and flowers on some Hellebore plants. These photos were taken on November 28/20.





We usually find flowers on the white plant on Christmas day, depending on the snow cover. This plant keeps it's flowers even when covered in snow and they poke through during winter thaws. However, the other plant does not usually have buds until April. The weather has been so unseasonal lately that anything is possible. This is a real welcomed treat that our gardens may be giving us.

These two plants are older varieties of Hellebores, as the flowers are low, close to the base, and facing down. Many of the newer varieties have longer flower stems with the flowers facing up.

Now for more seasonal plants like Poinsettias, Cyclamens, Frosted Ferns, Amaryllis. They all like light and moisture, but not sitting in water. The care instructions that come with these are good, and then use your own judgment and treat them the same as your other houseplants.

The trick for these starts in the store, when picking the plant.

The coloured bracts or leaves on the Poinsettia are not the flowers. The small yellow flowers are clustered at the base of the stems of the upper most bracts. Try to choose plants with some flower life still left.

Gently separate the leaves of a Cyclamen and look for hidden buds. These are the future flowers that will make this plant last for many weeks.


Amaryllis bulbs grow fast. Sometimes leaves come first. When the thicker flower stem starts, watch the sun light it is getting, as the stem will go for the light. Rotate the plant frequently so the stem will grow straight.


How you bring these tropical plants home is important. They need to be protected from the cold. Plan to get the plant at the end of your shopping trip and head straight home. The paper or plastic sleeves the store may supply will not protect them for long. Put the plants in the car with you close to the heater and maybe wrap a blanket around them.

When you get home, take the plants into the house first. The groceries can wait, the ice cream is not about to melt at this time of year. Open up the store wrapping to let the warm air into the plant. If the leaves do not turn black in a few hours, you have been successful. Because, baby it's cold outside!

Maple Leaf for Forever

The St. George Garden club from 2003 and 2016 was involved in the Roadside Tree Program started by three former Garden Club members. Jim Ross, the last of the three, passed away on November 5th, 2020 at St. George.

Jim Ross, Hank Hedges and Gil Henderson got together to form a group to put the maple tree back on the roadsides in Brant County. They enlisted the help of several organizations and the Garden club along with Grand River Conservation, The Lion's Club of St. George, Tim Hortons Onadonga Farm and the KELP students from Paris high school and other interested volunteers.

The volunteers would go out in April and plant the bare root trees in pre-dug holes that Jim Ross looked after getting dug each year along with getting the trees. The trees were 50mm and 14-16' high. The planning started the fall before for the spring planting as property owners had to be visited to get their permission to plant on their property. A crew went out in March to measure and stake where the trees were to be planted each year.

In April around Earth day the 40-50 volunteers would show up and the work got started, stopping for lunch at noon and continuing on. The first 10 years, 200 trees were planted along the roadsides each spring. As the distance that was travelled with wagons and tractors limited the area we travelled to, the number of trees went down to 100 the last few years. There are nearly 3000 maple trees planted along the Brant County roads close to St. George. In 2010 we veered into Flamborough. Jim's last planting was around his property at Valley Feeds in Cambridge, which presented a lot of challenges. You can enjoy the legacy left by this group and thank Jim Ross for spearheading the program. The St, George Garden club honoured Jim Ross in 2010 with a plaque done by Gil Henderson, listing all the groups that had volunteered over the years. This was presented by the then President, Irene Thurston, at an Annual meeting. The Ontario Horticultural Organization awarded the Tree Planting Group the Community Award in 2015.

You can admire the maple trees along Branchton Road, Howell Road, Glen Morris Road east and west, St. George Road, Patrick Road, and McLean School Road. It is the hope that these trees will be enjoyed by generations to come.
