OHA Convention Windsor July 2019-Bonnie Teskey **Hummingbirds**

At the Ontario Horticultural Association convention in Windsor in July 2019, I attended a presentation on banding hummingbirds. It was hosted by a husband & wife team, Rachel & Carl Pesco.

For them to catch the hummers, they have a very large screened cage with an opening for the birds to enter & a hummingbird feeder hanging in the middle. When a bird enters & starts feeding, they can easily catch them. They are then measured. They check the wing length. Females have larger wings; this helps to tell the sex especially on young birds. They check their fat by blowing on their stomachs with a straw. The birds don't seem to mind this & probably tickles them

The hummers each get individual numbers, so they have a unique identity. The bands are so small they can be stored on a large safety pin.

The banders always look for signs of stress. If any is detected the birds are immediately released even if it hasn't been banded or measured.

Their life cycle is approximately 5 years for females & 3 years for males, but some have been recorded at 9 years for a female & 5 years for a male.

It is true that some hummingbirds come back to the same area each year. They are usually spotted around mid to late May & they usually depart in late August to mid-September. There are exceptions to this. If you see them earlier, they may be migrants heading further north.

From mid-April or early May, check your feeders in early morning or near sunset to see the first visitors appear.

It takes 6 weeks from laying an egg to the bird fledging. Laying can be as late as July with fledging as late as mid-September.

When young they can be killed by predators, but once they have reached their first year not many things can catch them as they can fly backwards & sideways as well as frontwards.

They have a radius of $\frac{1}{4}$ mile but have been spotted 1 mile away & as far as 4 miles away. They don't have enough data yet to make a general statement.

Regarding the ruby throat of the male, their feathers are not actually red. The feathers refract light & this is what causes the iridescent read throat. If the light comes from a different angle, the ruby red might not show, sometimes it can look black.

They sure are interesting to watch.

I enjoyed this presentation very much & I thank you for this opportunity to have attended the convention.
