Rules and Guidelines

- You must be a member of OMHS, child/grandchild of an OMHS member, or member of a School Garden Club.

- Adults may enter up to 4 different photos in any class, not to exceed 20 in total.
- Youth may enter up to 2 photos in each class, not to exceed 16 in total.
- All entries MUST be 4" X 6" colour prints, either glossy or matte finish.
- All prints must contain some garden or natural material.
- Each photo must have **an entry tag** (available at all meetings) attached to the bottom of the photo and include your name and class number.
- Entries must be received no later than October 26, 2020. Entries may be mailed, delivered, or brought to the October 26 meeting (or prior meetings).
- New this year: As well as entering a colour print, please send your .jpg picture file by Dec 15 to OMHS-jpgs@gmail.com. Identify each .jpg file with this naming format: Class#-Your Last Name-First name-picture title.jpg (e.g., C1-okeefe-georgia-rose arbour.jpg).
 - Winning photos are featured in next year's yearbook, as well as a selection of photos for the new bookmarks.
- Ribbons will be awarded at the judge's discretion.

Classes in the Photo Competition:

Class 1	Garden architecture – garden art, structures, outbuildings, water features, rocks, or hardscape that enhance or are enhanced by plants.
Class 2	Close-up of any portion of a plant (flower, seedpod, leaf etc.).
Class 3	Marigolds on their own, either as a single bloom or grouping.
Class 4	Native plants of Canada in a natural or garden setting.
Class 5	Fungi of any kind in Canada.
Class 6	Seasonal Canadian photos – nature in all its glory (Spring, Summer, Fall, and Winter).
Class 7	Plants with animals – a photo of animals including birds, fish, insects, mammals, or reptiles in a natural or garden setting. Plant life must be included.
Class 8	Beautiful Canadian gardens – can be public or private gardens and may include those on our Garden Tour with the owner's permission.















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
