This is the time of year to harvest your own seeds for next year's garden. This time honored task can be fun and satisfying.

Here are some plants that are really easy for first timers:

Marigold

**Z**innia

Cleome

Cosmos

**Sunflowers** 

**Beans** 

**Pumpkin** 

Squash

Harvest the seeds on a dry day and store them in a cool dry place. Make sure you have seeds from a mature seed head for flowers or a large vegetable.

Make sure the seeds are dry before storing.

\*Note: I store my seeds in paper envelopes.
