Be sure to take a trip downtown to admire their handiwork.

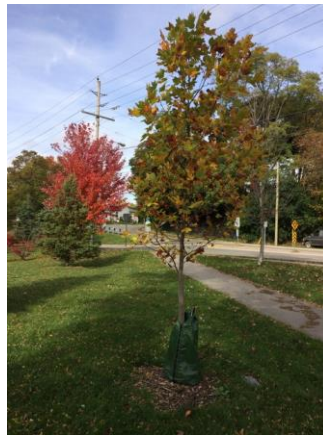


Thanks to: The Heritage Business Improvement Area (HBIA), once again, donated funds towards the expenses for these baskets and planters.

Club donation of Trees in Port Hope: The Club made a donation of a tree in 2019 and again in 2020; both were planted this past summer. The first, a tulip tree, was planted in the Kinsmen Park near the newly constructed gazebo along the river. It looks very nice; one can sit in the gazebo and enjoy the river and trees while on a walk. The second tree, a red oak, is to the west of the play structure at the West Beach. Both trees are marked with an acknowledgement plaque crediting the Club.
