# **Upcoming Events**

- March 19 Quinte Botanical Gardens: The Development of our Public Gardens - 6 acres of unique garden themes open now for their third year.
- April 16 Lois Scott Master Gardener, Peterborough: Pruning Basics, discussion and presentation of when to prune, how to prune, why to prune, tools needed and resources.
- May 21 Anna Leggatt Rock Gardens: A rock garden is a small plot of ground designed to feature a variety of rocks, stones or boulders with small gaps in between for small plants, trees and shrubs.
- June 18 Heather Ray from Green Up Peterborough Rain Gardens: A garden that lies below the level of its surroundings, designed to absorb rainwater that runs off of a surface such as a patio or roof. Rain gardens provide a method to reuse and optimize any rain that falls, reducing the need for additional irrigation.




# Colour of the Year

# Forest Bathing – What in the World is Forest Bathing?

Shinrin Yoku - is the Japanese word meaning Forest Bathing. The practice originated in Japan and it is basically taking in the Forest through our senses.

Forest Bathing is the international practice of connecting with nature and surrounding yourself with the energy of the natural world. The sound of the Forest, the scent of the trees, the sunshine or rain playing off the leaves and the clean air are all part of Forest bathing

No phones, no cameras, just let nature enter through your eyes, ears, nose, mouth, hands and feet. Studies have shown Forest Bathing reduces stress, improves feelings of happiness, increases creativity, lowers blood pressure and heart rate, boosts the immune system and accelerates recovery from illness.

There are many designated forest bathing sites in Ontario, Credit Valley, Blue Mountain, Provincial parks, Halton and Hamilton to name just a few. There are even Forest Bathing certificates, diplomas and guide training.

I think Gardeners already know all the benefits of nature but when 80% of Canadians live in urban areas you can see why new day trips, vacations and prescriptions will include Forest Bathing.

#### Recycling and Garbage Update By Bill Brouwer

This year, 2020, the township of Selwyn is making changes to our garbage and recycling pickups. In this year's property tax letters, you should have received a "Yellow" card with the information explaining the details/rules re: pickup for garbage and recycling.

You can call Peterborough County Environmental Services at 705-775-2737 ext. 0 for additional information or clarification.

Below is my understanding of their rules.

#### GARBAGE INFORMATION:

The township is launching a soft (i.e. an introduction period) start, beginning on March 1, 2020, to their "Clear Bag Program". This is to ensure that NO recyclables go to the landfill.

This soft start ends on September 1, 2021. After September 1st, your garbage will not be picked up if not bagged properly. That is, the garbage you put out will no longer be picked up, if you are using opaque, coloured bags.

If your garbage was not picked up, the garbageman will tag your garbage bag/container with an explanation of where you erred. Bags must be clear and see-through. This ensures that the garbageman will be able to quickly view that there are no recyclables in your garbage.

If you use a liner for your garbage pail, this too must be of clear plastic. However, you do not have to line your garbage pail/container.

You can use one (1) opaque bag (the size of a grocery bag) contained within your garbage. I have not found any details as to what you can or cannot put in this opaque bag.

Garbage pails/containers cannot exceed 30 pounds each. You can put out up to 2 bags per week.

Kitchen scraps should be composted and are not considered garbage. I have not seen any data as how the township plans to deal with this problem.

You can purchase compost bins at the Township of Selwyn municipal office.

#### **RECYCLING INFORMATION:**

Your household recycling must be sorted. You are allowed two (2) blue boxes. One for containers and one for paper materials.

Bags are not permitted to be used as a recycling container. Recycling cannot be put in the garbage.

You can buy recycling blue boxes from the Township of Selwyn municipal office for \$5.00 each.

### Recyclable Containers

- o Glass (clear and coloured food and drink bottles and jars)
- o Plastic
  - o Tubs and lids: yogurt, spreads and dips, sour cream, margarine
  - o Bottles and jugs: water, juice, pop, lotion, shampoo, laundry detergent
  - Containers and trays: pre-cut fruit and vegetable trays, strawberry and baked goods containers, including black plastic containers
- o Plastic Bags
  - o Grocery, milk, bread bags
  - o Toilet paper and water bottle overwrap
  - o Soil, water softener and newspaper bags
- Cartons and cups (juice and milk cartons, drinking and broth boxes, coffee cups no lids, take-out cold drink cups)
- o Metal
  - o Pop cans, pie plates and aluminium foil
  - o Food and drink cans and tins
  - o Empty paint cans (lids off and dry) and empty aerosol cans
- o Please no Styrofoam, chip bags, wrappers, or liners from cereal/cracker boxes.

💦 Recyclable Paper 💦

- Single-use disposable plastic cups are garbage.
- o Boxes and rolls
  - All boxes: cereal, cracker, shoe, shipping
  - o Paper rolls: toilet, paper towel, wrapping paper tubes
- o Paper
  - o Printed paper and envelopes
  - o Newspaper and flyers
  - o Magazines and telephone books
  - o Shredded paper, placed in clear plastic bags

# Things that will not to be picked up at the curb:

Manufacturer's or industrial waste, any explosive, hazardous or highly combustible material; ashes, construction debris, sawdust and/or shavings; liquid waste, hay, straw and manure, leaves, grass clippings and brush; major appliances, large household furnishings; and tires.

#### Additional services at the landfill site:

Waste Electronics and Electrical materials. Tires Leaf and Yard Waste Construction and Demolition debris Metal Household Hazardous Waste Batteries Recycling.
