UPDATE ON HIGHWAY OF HEROES by Marilyn Rawson

The highway of heroes is the stretch of highway 410 between CFB Trenton and the coroner's office in Toronto. In May it was announced that 10 million dollars had been raised. This was the initial goal. The program was started in 2014. The tree planting is the largest living memorial to fallen military members. In July of 2022 Mark Cullen, the campaign chair, and Mark Hurly gave an update. Mark Hurly is the executive director of the New Trees for Life organization which started in 2021. After the initial Highway of Heroes stretch, trees have been planted in Ontario from the Quebec border to Windsor. This year 275,000 will be planted and the goal of 2 million trees will be reached by Remembrance Day. Then trees will be planted across the rest of the country. Some benefits are that 2 million trees will sequester over 3 million tons of carbon in the first 100 years and produce more than 300 million pounds of oxygen. Habitat for nature is provided, and water is transpired each day, plus there are other benefits.

Red is the colour for this year and can be found in some of these fall flowers-Asters, Chrysanthemums, Russian Sage, Autumn Sedum, Fushias, Heuchea, Red Jewel Helenium, Celosias, Amaranthus, Verbena, Salvias, Turtleheads, Gamphrena Glabosa, Shrub Rose and Sumac.

Fall can be a busy time in the garden with cleaning up the flower beds, dividing and moving plants, pruning, planting spring bulbs, digging up certain bulbs, collecting herbs for drying, planting new trees and shrubs, and raking leaves to use as mulch.

Fire flies (also called lightning bugs)- good

Praying Mantis (close relative to termite and cockroach)- good, bad and ugly

Ear Wig (200 species)- bad and ugly


Honey Bee (fly to 50-100 flowers daily, can fly 6 miles per day, Queen produces 2500 eggs per day)- definitely good
