At our June meeting we were treated to an interesting presentation by Rick Stronks whose background as a park naturalist fostered in him a love of birding.

Rick encouraged us to get involved with local groups such as The Huntsville Nature Club as a way to learn about birds in our area, develop like-minded friendships and improve our health.

We learned about ways to identify birds through their colour, shape, size, bill shape and patterns as well as their behavior and flight patterns.

We were introduced to some excellent birding resources: Sibley Field guide to birds of Eastern Canada North America

Rick advised that it was ok to feed birds in the winter but that it's advisable to take feeders down in the spring when bears emerge from hibernation. He also discussed the benefits of growing native trees as a food source as they tend to contain many more varieties of caterpillars than do non-native tree varieties and that birds love native service berries as well as choke and pin cherries. Water in low dishes in your yard can also be beneficial to our bird visitors understanding that both our water dishes and bird feeders should be cleaned weekly with a solution of 10% bleach/water mix.

We all left the meeting feeling inspired to spend time watching our feathered friends and hoping that we may be lucky enough to spot a rare specimen at our feeders.
