Fees are due, January and February of 2024. They remain at \$15 for single and \$20 for family.


If they are not paid by March 2024, you will no longer receive the newsletter.

HOW TO CARE FOR YOUR POINSETTIA: (Info taken from Web article by Arricca Elin Sansone)

With the right care your poinsettia should last 6 weeks to 2 months. They are a tropical plant growing to trees in some locations, but in our climate, it is very difficult to get them to last and bloom again.



- 1. Look for tightly closed tiny yellow flowers in the middle, should be greenish as they open, then to yellow indicates bloom as they open. If they are shedding pollen the plant is past its prime.
- 2. Check under wrapping for yellow foliage. Plant would not be a good choice.
- 3. Protect by covering for your trip home. Don't let it sit in a chilly car for too long.
- 4. Replace the foil over the pot with a pretty vessel that allows drainage.
- 5. As a tropical, it will love light but having been grown in a greenhouse it will be used to indirect light. However, a dark corner will force it to reach for the light and become stretched and leggy.
- 6. Temperature in the house should be between 18" 21' C.
- 7. Water regularly, allowing for consistent light moisture not soaking. Try 1 cup of water every 2-3 days, dump out any excess. If allowed to dry out the plant will begin to drop leaves in order to protect the root system. If this happens, compost and buy a new one.
- 8. Keep away from pets, it is not lethal but the milky white sap is irritating to their mouths or skin if not washed off. If it is ingested, the safe thing to do would be to call a vet. Better to be safe than sorry.
- 9. If your plant is beginning to look leggy, you can cut off individual flowers and display in a vase. Wear gloves as the sap can be irritating to human skin as well. An individual flower could also be displayed in a pretty bowl of water.
- 10. It is possible to repot and keep it for another year but in our climate, this is very challenging.
