Native Healing Garden

We are fortunate to have a Norfolk–based garden where the community can grow and learn about native healing plants. Many thanks to the Port Dover Lions Club who generously offered us a plot of land in Silver Lake Park, providing a tranquil setting for our garden. We hope to nurture relations with our indigenous community and so chose Turtle Island as our garden's design to showcase native healing plants. We have created the innermost oval of our turtle's shell and as new rims are added, we are hoping to outline the features of the turtle's shell and to provide walkways across and through the shell for close-up viewing of the plant material. Volunteers are welcome to assist in planting, tending and learning about native healing plants.

Flower Show Rules, Tips and Prizes

These apply to all PD & WHS competitions and flower shows, including the October Joint meeting.

Definitions:

See OJES (Ontario Judging and Exhibiting Standards Book) available at monthly meetings.

Flower Show Rules:

- All exhibitors must be paid-up members of the Society; memberships may be purchased at the door.
- Design classes: material can be from any source and need not be grown by the exhibitor. Accessories may be used as specified in OJES.
- All SPECIMENS must have been grown by the exhibitor.
- Buds showing colour will count as a bloom.
- "Specimens with own foliage": ONLY own foliage permitted unless otherwise specified.
- Exhibitors supply own containers.
- If more than one entry is allowed in a class, they must be different
- cultivars.
- Potted plants must have been container grown and in the exhibitor's possession for at least 3 months.
- Judging will be in accordance with Ontario Judging & Exhibiting Standards Book, (OJES 2019)
- Judge's decision is final.

Photography Competition Rules:

- Photo prints not to be larger than 5" x 7".
- Photos to be on photographic paper, unframed, unmatted, unless otherwise specified; prints with small borders are acceptable.
- Judging scale: Horticulture value 40%, Photographic value 40%, General impact 20%

Flower Show Tips:

- Container-grown plants should be groomed and free of dust and pests
- Containers, to be provided by the exhibitor, should be clean and not foil-covered.
- There should be a well-proportioned relationship between plant and container
- Size, colour and shape, and correct number are important as specified.
- Proper staging and grooming are important.
- Name plants whenever possible
- Use name and address stickers for convenient personal identification on entry tags.
- Entry tags will be available at each show at set-up time


