## Section A - Vegetables/Fruits

2 Beet, top removed to within $1 / 2^{\prime \prime}(1.25 \mathrm{~cm})$ of crown, three specimens
3 Brassicas, i.e. broccoli, cauliflower, cabbage, one head
4 Leafy greens, 2 leaves in water
5 Carrots, top removed to within $1 / 2^{\prime \prime}(1.25 \mathrm{~cm})$ of crown, three roots
6 Collection of at least five and no more than twelve herbs, named, one stem each in a single container
7 Collection of vegetables in a basket, named, at least two specimens of each of at least five kinds
8 Cucumber, any, no more than $45.5 \mathrm{~cm}\left(18^{\prime \prime}\right)$, 2 specimens, part of stem intact
9 Fruit, nut or berries, any ripe, one variety, named, representative sample of specimens
10 Onion, any, three bulbs
11 Garlic, three bulbs
12 Peppers, hot, $1 / 2^{\prime \prime}(1.25 \mathrm{~cm})$ stem, three fruits

14 Potato, any variety, three tubers the same
15 Squash, any summer variety other than zucchini, stem intact, one fruit

Tomato collection, two specimens of at least three varieties, except cherries

Vegetable Critter, vegetables, fruit and flowers used to create a fanciful critter. Produce may be cut, toothpick only may be used to attach pieces together, but they must not show. Vegetable must predominate Size is limited to what will fit onto a plate no larger than 12" ( 30 cm )

Vegetable, any other not named above, must be named, representative sample

PAVE DESIGN: Pave is a technique of placing groups of plant material that have been cut short, close together to form undulating mounds of colours, textures, shapes, and sizes om a low pan or container.

Any plant material can be used e.g. flowers, foliage, cut stems, fruits, vegetables, moss, etc. fresh or dried can be used.

INTERPRETIVE DESIGN: A design where a given theme, idea, occasion, mood, atmosphere, etc. is suggested by the selection and organization of the design elements.

SATELLITE DESIGN: A design with a main unit and a smaller unit of the same colour, form and/or texture which do not touch each other but have a connective line between the units that becomes a vital part of the rhythmic pattern of the design.

## EXHIBITING INSTRUCTIONS:

POTTED PLANTS: Plants should be displayed in the pots they are grown in and have been grown by the exhibitor for a minimum of three months. They should be well established, mature and be well balanced in shape.

TROUGH/CONTAINER GARDEN: A miniature garden designed to reproduce a natural ecosystem. The container frames and gives the garden its characteristic landscape shape.
