

For many years, care of the garden was led by Julie Taylor, who still works in an advisory capacity, particularly choosing the annual flowers. Currently a small committee of Jennifer Greer, Suzanne Guiney, Melanie Steers and Pam Welbourn take care of it. With a

mixture of flowering shrubs, perennial and annuals, there is hardly ever any bare space in the garden and we strive for continuous colour over the seasons.

## COMMUNITY REPORT

We continued in 2023 with our community-focused programs to provide educational outreach, community beautification, and encourage gardening as a healthy lifestyle.

- In 2023, after two years of Covid restrictions, we resumed in-person meetings and once again, we were able to hold two in-person Flower Shows, enjoyed the annual Gananoque Garden Tour, had a very successful Plant Sale (best on record), and hosted our 103rd Anniversary Celebration in our park with a good old fashioned summer picnic.
- We have continued to have virtual rather than in-person board meetings as we continue to be concerned with the health of our Board members. We held in-person monthly general meetings starting in February, hosting many local and regional guest speakers.
- \* Our social media continues to be our method of reaching out to the community. We have about 500 plus followers on Facebook and Instagram. We have 58 YouTube videos available on a range of topics.
- ☼ On YouTube, the Society has 551 followers and our videos have had 75,000 hits. In 2023, despite Covid-19, our members gave a total of 1524 volunteer hours.
- \* Our community beautification projects included upgrading our Park with a much-needed watering system. Our beautiful display gardens in the Horticultural Park at 21 Main St. are an oasis for all. Keeping the garden watered will no longer be a chore.
- A severe summer storm caused damage to the beautiful old red maple in the Park and resulted in immediate emergency repairs having to be done.

- The effects of climate change on the severity of the weather means we must be more vigilant in the maintenance of the trees in our Park.
- & Once again this year, our Seed and Book Library has been a tremendous success. We gave away over 1000 packages of free seeds. By providing free seeds and advice, we encourage people to garden, grow food, and create their own places of beauty. Once the season for distributing seeds was over, we kept our lending library stocked with free books and magazines on all manners of gardening.
- & Our Horticultural Society Park, in conjunction with the Town's Confederation Park/Sculpture Park, is part of the 1000 Islands and Rideau Canal Garden Adventure, an initiative of Leeds and Grenville Counties. As part of this provincially recognized Garden Tourism Trail, the Park must be very well maintained for the entire growing season. For the main flower bed, we used plantings of bright "Bubblegum" Petunias - Petunia being the emblem of the Town and our organization - and added other annuals for additional visual impact to the perennial beds. The Garden Adventure Trail provides a wonderful opportunity both to showcase the Horticultural Society Park and the Confederation Park/Sculpture Park gardens, and to bring additional tourism dollars to the Town of Gananoque. The produce from our four-square garden was shared and enjoyed. Our Anniversary shade garden, added in 2020, has filled in nicely, and is a good example to demonstrate how to garden in, not only shade, but dry shade. The



plants grown in this area are all viable in our local Gananoque climate. In addition, in 2023, we have equipped our park with four educational signs one for each of the following park's feature gardens: the Pollinator, 4-Square, Daylily Garden, and about using leaf mulch in our flower beds. The Park has had 450 beautiful spring bulbs added and will be a spring delight.

- We were privileged to be selected by the Noel Bullock Estate to receive one of Noel's sculptures, which has been located in the upper garden. Noel was a Canadian contemporary artist who lived here in Gananoque just down the street from our park and who enjoyed our park. An official ribbon cutting will take place in the spring of 2024.
- ★ Our Educational Bursary of \$500 was awarded to an area student graduating from Grade 12 who is continuing education in Environmental Science.
- \* We changed our way of distributing our Challenge Plant Program. Each year we select a plant, either a flower or vegetable, and purchase seeds for distribution to our members. Each member gets a packet of seeds to take home. This year we moved the seed handout to March and the selected seed was an unusual bean. Members shared what they grew as part of our September Flower Show. We ran two full-scale in-person Flower Shows in June and in September. Photos of the Shows were posted on Facebook, Instagram, and

our website. Once again, we received incredibly positive feedback not only from our members but others in the community. Everyone enjoyed seeing what we were growing. Social media continues to be an important means to keep people connected.

- ★ In July, the Society participated in the Carveth Long Term Care Centre Family Day festivities, hosting a craft table for the children taking part in the event. We also maintained the Palliative care garden at Carveth.
- ★ Our Trillium Garden Award was given out to a garden in the North Ward this year. In addition to this award, we honoured town gardeners, both residential and commercial, with "Curb Appeal Awards" for those who had colourful, beautiful front yards and gardens. Twenty-four award certificates were placed in gardens, with photos of the award winners and their gardens posted on Facebook for the community to see. Beautiful plantings create a positive environment that we feel has been a benefit in the current times of stress and uncertainty.
- We are finishing off our year with our Raffle, which had been postponed by COVID. Another very successful year. But no President's report is complete without a huge thank you to all our members who volunteer their time to all our programs. Volunteers make it possible to do all that we do in the community and for our members.

# The Gananoque Horticultural Society Park **Turns 100 Years Old**

OUR PARK TURNS 100 YEARS OLD IN 2024! The story of how the Gananoque Horticultural Society came to be owners of a park is an interesting one. William Stone Macdonald, the last Macdonald owner of the impressive family home, Blinkbonnie, died unexpectedly on May 18, 1923 at age 61. His widow, Louise Davies Macdonald, immediately started selling off the Macdonald properties in Gananoque, including Blinkbonnie and its furnishings, Maplecroft Farm in the east end of Gananoque and a piece of property that included Lots 608 and 610 at the corner of Mill and Main Streets. The recently created Horticultural Society had already been involved in developing gardens on this property, with work bees held there in late April and early May 1923. So it seemed logical that these two lots be turned over to the Society.

On January 22, 1924, three Trustees for the Gananoque Horticultural Society signed an Indenture transferring ownership of the two lots to the Society for the sum of \$1.00. These three Trustees were John C. Linklater, teacher and principal for whom Linklater School was named, and the President of the Society in 1924-1925; Andrew Edwards, a real estate agent and former cabinetmaker, and Society President from 1926-1932; and Josephus T. Green, a Society Director and Town Postmaster.

The Park was initially planted with a combination of annuals and perennials, with an early photo showing hollyhocks bordering the edges of the Park and a few small trees. A Memorial Stone commemorating the history of the Park, where the first store and post office in the town of Gananoque had been located, was unveiled by Isabella Macdonald on August 7, 1924 as part of Old Home Week. However the stone was expensive, and its cost put the Society in the red for the only time in its history. A small Town grant helped offset the cost of the Memorial Stone, but to economize in those early years, the Society made every effort to use donated plants in the Park. Two peonies were given to the Park following the Prince of Wales' 1927 docking in Gananoque, and were planted on either side of the Memorial Stone. However, the Society found care of the gardens in the Park time consuming and expensive, given that its members were also caring for numerous other plots around town as well as gardens at the new East and West Gates. In 1928, when Leeds Motors was built just east of the Park, the owner, Bruce Showler,

proposed that the Society allow the company to create an access road across the upper Park, and in return the company would care for the gardens in the Park. This arrangement lasted until 1952, and photos taken about 1950 show a well-kept and attractive Park. From 1952, when Leeds Motors was sold, until the beginning of the 21st century, the Park was primarily a green space, with small gardens around the Memorial Stone, and a number of trees and benches. Over the last 25 years, the Park has been transformed into a series of gardens, with colour throughout three seasons of the year.

This past year saw a significant addition to the Park. Although water has been available in the Park since 1976, keeping the gardens adequately watered has long been a challenge. On July 24-25, Down Under Irrigation installed an irrigation system with 5 watering zones, designed to run in the very early morning as programmed. The watering system provides excellent coverage of the gardens, and will make it easier to create lusher gardens, especially in the upper garden and along the south edges of the Park which have often been very dry.

Another new feature is four laminated signs explaining features of the Park - the Four Square Garden; the Pollinator Garden; the Daylily bed; and the use of leaf mulch. These signs answer some of the questions frequently asked by visitors to the Park.

In early August, a second sculpture was installed in the Park, in this case in the upper garden. The untitled, solid brass sculpture by



local artist sculptor Gaye Noel Bullock was donated to the park by his estate. Noel was a founder of the Gananoque Arts Network, and was known for large outdoor public sculptures, as well as paintings in various mediums. He passed away from lymphoma in June 2021.

The Seed library was well used again this year. Starting in mid-April, after the danger of heavy frost was over, seed packages were stocked in 4 boxes, divided into Annuals, Perennials, Vegetables and Herbs. Approximately 1000 packages were made available during a 3 week period and by early May had all been claimed by eager gardeners. Subsequently, approximately 100 magazines and 75 books were stocked in the library and taken by interested gardeners. This fall, we added 450 bulbs to the gardens to bring additional colour to our early spring landscape. We planted 250 'Pickwick' crocuses in clumps around the Pollinator Garden, plus 100 pink/red shaded

'Hemisphere' tulips, 50 'Martha Stewart' and 50 'Pink Charm' Daffodils in the upper garden.

A major limb broke off the large red maple on August 4, falling between two of the benches on the south side of the Park. Fortunately, no one was in the Park at the time the tree limb fell. Sideline Tree Services came out quickly and were able to remove the tree limb, which was estimated to be in the 400 kg (900 lb) range. On November 28, staff from A Better View did major work on the tree, with one staff member climbing the maple tree and doing significant pruning, while others fed the trimmed branches through the chipper.


Estimated visitation in the Park was significantly higher this past year, as tourism in Gananoque surpassed pre-Covid levels. Visitors from town and around the world enjoyed brief walks through the Park, or more extensive examination of the gardens, resting on the benches and having meals at the picnic table. An estimated 80,000 visitors enjoyed the Park this season.

Many thanks to all our enthusiastic garden volunteers. We had at least two helpers every week from mid-May to early October. Their work makes such a difference in keeping the garden tidy, attractive and relatively weed free. Everyone who visits the Park enjoys it, which makes our hard work in creating a beautiful Park so very gratifying.

## **GARDENING MEMORIES**

A SIMPLE PLEASURE that I have come to enjoy is gardening. Maybe not always so simple, when Mother Nature rebels against our careful planning! Gardening is indeed an endless battle with nature, but in so many ways is a pleasure. As Susan Glickman in a Globe and Mail 'First person' article wrote, gardening is "restorative both physically and spiritually".

The fun of planning, which can be done during the long and sometimes dreary winter months, is aided by the clever commercials and catalogues with which we are bombarded during those winter months, proves material for dreams and excitement for the season ahead.

Then there's the satisfaction and physical work of 'spring cleaning', removing the debris and dead plants that didn't make it over the winter (or that we should have dug out but ran out of time for in the fall) and eagerly looking for signs of life in the early spring bulbs. Some spring flowers are old friends from previous years and others were planted last fall and remain to provide surprises (shocks?) in spring. Snowdrops are the first harbingers of spring and often stay in flower for many weeks. Snowdrops are typically followed by crocuses, which are fragile and short-lived and often succumb to the battering wind and rain. But being ephemeral seems to add to their gift.

Wordsworth said all that needs to be said about the pleasure that daffodils can give, and his were naturalized in fields, while for most of us in North America, daffodils are in flower beds. Daffodils fade as May comes in and are replaced or sometimes joined by tulips. Tulips are so different from

daffodils and other Narcissus, in their rather stiff forms, and quite honestly are not at the top of my list of favourites, but they do come in an amazing array of colours and forms. The biggest drawback is that squirrels love tulips, both bulbs and flowers (in contrast to daffs which squirrels don't touch), so one is constantly doing battle, re-planting the corpses, applying blood meal and trying other devices (mostly useless) to protect tulips.

Soon comes the planting of seeds, or of seedlings of annual plants purchased from nurseries and other stores, providing tasks for the spring. In fact, starting seeds indoors in March, perhaps too tedious and messy for some, is for many of us one of the earliest of simple pleasures.

Then there are the weeds. As my dad taught me, they are all wild flowers, but in the garden there is no denying that some of these are unwelcome. As I remove them, I sometimes marvel at the strategies that they have developed, which makes them so successful as weeds. Examples are the extensive series of rooted runners that Creeping Charlie uses to invade lawns and flower beds, and the prolific wind-borne seeds of the dreaded dandelions.

The whole cycle of gardening is a dynamic process, which adds to its charms, as well as its (very occasional!) frustrations. Sitting quietly in the garden may seem like a passive or contemplative activity, but in truth it never is. One cannot avoid seeing things that need attention, and it takes a lot of self-control not to be leaping up, getting one's un-gloved hands and nails dirty, to tackle something that needs immediate attention. But it's all pleasurable. &





**All-America Selections 2024** 

There is only one national, non-profit plant trialing organization, the All-America Selections (AAS). The organization tests new, never before sold varieties primarily for the home gardener. The trials are held anonymously for a year by volunteer horticulture professionals, then the top performers are awarded the AAS winner designation for their superior performance.

Geranium Big EEZE Pink Batik – is sure to impress gardeners with its stunning pink petals, with pink and white striations. The plants are very floriferous, are well suited to container growing and are heat tolerant. The variety is available as plants only, not as seeds.

**Petchoa EnViva Pink** – This Petchoa (a combination petunia and calibrachoa) is stunning, with fuchsia pink petals and yellow throat. It retained its colour throughout the season, is heat tolerant and the flowers bounce back after a rain. The plant has a mounding habit. Petchoa EnViva Pink is only available as plants.

**Pepper Red Impact F1** – a long red Lamuyo type pepper that is easy to grow. It is sweeter than other varieties and loaded with fruits for high yield. The Red Impact F1 pepper is early maturing and very deep red.



# Challenge Plant - 'Moody Blues' Nigella

This eye-catching annual 'Love-in-a-Mist' features double flowers in varying shades of blue, from very pale to delphinium. The plants are 70 cm (28 inches) tall, and can be sown directly in your sunny beds. The flowers are followed by attractive seed pods.

## **BURSARY WINNERS**

Our Horticultural Society Bursary was first awarded in 2008, and we have been pleased to present a \$500 bursary to local area students every year since, except for 2021. In the height of the COVID pandemic, there were no applications that year, but we have given bursaries in both the years since.

#### CREATIVE PRIZE DONATIONS \* \$2,040 FUNDS RAISED \* FOUR HAPPY WINNERS

In 2020, the Board made plans to hold a raffle, partly in celebration of the  $100^{\text{th}}$  anniversary of the Society, and partly as a fundraiser. Then, in March 2020, the onset of the COVID pandemic closed everything down. The raffle prizes went into storage for three years until it became possible to get out, interact with people and start selling tickets. The Society had 1000 new tickets printed, set up a dedicated bank account and began selling tickets to members and the public in April 2023. Several Board members manned a table at the Farmer's Market for a number of Thursdays to sell tickets, and in the fall, a door to door campaign around town helped push sales to 950 tickets. 2023 saw our 17th year of awarding deserving local gardeners. We had a two-year absence due to Covid in 2020-21. The purpose of the award is to encourage all residents of the town to keep their street-facing gardens attractive throughout the growing season.

A different ward is selected each year and the judges travel up and down all the streets by car selecting gardens of particular merit. 


