The Ontario Horticultural Association is a volunteer, charitable organization whose mission is to provide leadership and assist in the promotion of education and interest in all areas of horticulture and related environmental issues in Ontario, through an expanding network of horticultural societies dedicated to the beautification of their communities. The Ontario Horticultural Association pursues its mission by:

- providing grants for trees and community beautification projects throughout Ontario.
- developing programs in the areas of conservation and the environment, youth and horticulture.
- providing support to its member horticultural societies in the form of shared insurance plans, promotion, speaker lists, procedure manuals, volunteer recognition, projects, events and web sites.
- holding an annual convention and providing educational opportunities for members.
- publishing items of a horticultural or environmental nature such as the Trillium newsletter, the Rain Barrel Booklet and the Ontario Judging Standards.

We introduced Haskap berry plants to society members who had not grown them before. We took a public stand against the use of Neonicotinoid pesticides on ornamental plants. 



Communications:

Several tools were used to communicate within the OHA to keep in touch with our Member societies and to increase our exposure within the general population. We continue to seek a way to reach all members of all societies.

- GardenOntario.org, our website, continues to be our major source of communications and transmission of information and news for Society members and all interested members of the community.
- The quarterly publication, the Trillium, was emailed to a majority of societies and donors, with a hard copy mailed to those requiring it. All issues of the Trillium are posted on the GardenOntario.org home page. Past issues are archived on the website.
- Many District Directors generate their own newsletters and communicate important information to the Societies and general membership. All societies have OHA material for distribution.
- Publicity and Promotional pieces are developed and circulated to various locations and are available at our Outreach events.
- The Annual Convention of the Ontario Horticultural Association is the Annual General Meeting of the organization. At this meeting Member societies receive necessary financial and business reports. Election of the Executive for the coming year takes place. Networking, attending workshops, etc. foster social interaction.

The Ontario Horticultural Association Executive and Board members meet three times a year. At that time decisions are made which the members of the Board consider to be in the best interest of the societies they represent. These are some of the highlights from those meeting in 2014/15

OHA Corporate Plan for Sponsorship: A

committee will be struck to bring forth a corporate plan for sponsorship for the OHA.

Judging Committee – GCO & RBG Judges: The OHA has approved a process that would allow GCO and RBG judges to become certified and registered with the OHA Judges Registry. Hence they would be allowed to judge OHA shows.

Role of OHA Constitution Committee and Its Relationship with Societies: The OHA has seen a significant increase in requests for feedback and assistance with society constitutions. The OHA Constitution Committee is not comfortable with providing feedback on constitution writing and updating. The Constitution Committee Members are not legal experts. **In Good Standing Document**: The OHA Board discussed what "In Good Standing" means and will publish a document by January 2016 detailing what this means for societies.

OHA Convention Competitions Report: Deadlines and rules were harmonized amongst the competition committees for easier participation. The revised schedules will be uploaded to the OHA GardenOntario website soon.

Two \$1000 bursaries: The OHA has established a bursary of \$1,000 to a second or third year student at each of Lakehead University in relation to food security and to University of Guelph in relation to eco-friendly horticultural science to be awarded annually starting in 2015.

Seedy Saturday/Sunday events

Seedy Saturdays/Sundays bring together gardeners, farmers, seed savers and citizens passionate about gardening, food security and the environment. These one day non-profit public events often feature speakers and workshops, vendors, youth activities and seed exchanges and sales. The objective is to promote seed saving and the exchange of regionally adapted, bio-diverse seed in Ontario for the purposes of promoting seed saving and seed exchange in Ontario.

In 2014/15 the Ontario Horticultural Association established a grant which will provide two (2) grants of \$250 annually to its member societies to organize a first-time Seedy Saturday/Sunday event in their community. It is hoped that this support will encourage the development of the event throughout Ontario.

GardenOntario Week

This year the OHA quietly launched its latest initiative known as GardenOntario Week which was held from June 13 to 21, 2015. Inspired by the National Gardening Week events organized by the Royal Horticultural Society (RHS), our event was fashioned similar to theirs hoping to inspire our societies, partnering organizations and other groups to join in and share their knowledge and love of gardening in their communities across Ontario.

Over 75+ activities were posted on our GardenOntario Week web page that was created by Past President Carol Dunk. While the majority of these horticulture-related events were organized by OHA members, some community organizations and garden centres joined in the fun and created their very own. In District 13, we had an activity scheduled for every day but one.
