A Message from the OHA President

The year 2023 continued to see growth in the membership of the societies/clubs since the pandemic. Although a few societies/clubs were forced to close their doors, we had a new society opening theirs. The overall increase in membership within the Association is happening right across Ontario which is wonderful to see.

The OHA 50/50 raffle continues to assist us to be able to offer new grants and awards such as a new Technical Award and a new Accessibility Grant. It is important to the Association to be able to help the societies/clubs beautify and take pride in their communities.

ONCA comes into effect October 18th of 2024 and the Association continues to work diligently to ensure that all societies/clubs, districts and the governing body are prepared with any necessary changes required to their Constitution and By-laws to be in compliance.

April of each year, the OHA presents a WebEx for Earth Day. The WebEx can hold up to 1000 people and we encourage as many as possible to attend to hear fantastic speakers on interesting topics.

In October of 2023, the process of developing an OHA Family Scholarship/Bursary was begun. It is hoped that this will be open for applications in the Spring/Summer of 2025.

In order to keep the members of the Association informed and to inform members of the public on who we are and what we do, a benefits of belonging document along with an accessibility statement and a "who are we and what is our purpose?" document was created. The hope is that these documents will provide clarity to those interested in what we do as an Association.

Each year, OMAFRA provides training sessions for all the societies/clubs across the province. These are held in the late Fall and early New Year and provide training on the TPON system and OMAFRA reporting.



The 2023 OHA Convention and AGM was held at the Brookstreet Hotel in Kanata, Ontario on the weekend of July 19th to 23rd. The weekend provided good food, informative speakers and seminars, competitions, camaraderie with fellow members from across the province, awards banquet, silent auction, bus trips, vendors, the business of the Association and so much more. The 2024 Convention and AGM will take place in Guelph July 12th to 14th. Due to inflation and cost of living, this event will only take place every second year after 2024. The interim event will be an AGM business meeting only.

The OHA continues to run Strategic Planning and SWOT (Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities and Threats) Analysis reviews every October with a focus on moving the Association forward in a positive direction. All items currently in the works are discussed and new items are brought forward. All items up for review and/or discussion must include the SMART goal system and therefore must be Specific, Measurable, Achievable, Relevant and Time-Bound. Staying within these parameters when creating a goal helps to ensure that the objectives of the Association are met in a timely manner always with a view to the future.

All the societies/clubs across the province continue to plant and create hospitable areas in their communities to allow native plants to thrive, which in turn brings in more pollinators. The pollinators allow more growth to happen which keeps the air in our communities healthy. It is an amazing cycle of new growth and rebirth that we as an Association hope to be a part of for many generations to come.

It is important to remember all the volunteers that put forth countless hours each and every year to keep all these wonderful activities happening while saving the communities within our province millions of dollars which would otherwise have to be paid out.

- 12. Territorial District of Cochrane, Territorial District of Timiskaming.
- 13. Territorial District of Algoma, Territorial District of Manitoulin, Territorial District of Sudbury.
- 14. Territorial District of Kenora, Territorial District of Rainy River, Territorial District of Thunder Bay.
- 15. Peel, York west of Road No.1, Toronto west of Yonge Street.
- 16. Simcoe.
- 17. Durham and the portion of York that includes Georgina east of Park Road.
- 18. Territorial District of Parry Sound, Territorial District of Muskoka, Territorial District of Nipissing.






THE FINANCIAL PICTURE - 2023

VOLUNTEER HOURS

Through our local affiliated Societies/Clubs, the OHA is active across Ontario improving urban and rural landscapes, giving seniors' residences a hand with gardening, planting roadsides with wildflowers, planting trees and shrubs - the list of OHA activities is unlimited.

Volunteers are the backbone of everything we do. Joining our organization gives you the opportunity to meet new people, create friendships, develop new skills and share your love of gardening.

In 2023, 264 affiliated Societies/Clubs, District Executives and the OHA Board of Directors recorded 458,250 volunteer hours in community service across Ontario. This is an increase from 2022 of 51,753 volunteer hours. This is an amazing achievement and shows the commitment and dedication of all members of the OHA, even in the continued pandemic!

BURSARIES

The OHA continues to provide two annual bursaries of \$1,000, awarded on the basis of financial need, to a second or third year student attending Lakehead University (Ontario Horticultural Association Bursary) studying Forestry, Biodiversity & Conservation, Plant Sciences, Botany, Biochemistry or Environmental Management and to a continuing student at the University of Guelph (Ontario Horticultural Association Scholarship) concentrating their studies in Horticulture Science.

Districts and Societies/Clubs have also continued tremendous support to students with over \$53,375 provided in grants and bursaries in 2023.



These raffles play a pivotal role in supporting our overarching goal of Keeping Ontario Beautiful®. The funds raised through this initiative are allocated towards grants that promote various endeavors such as supporting pollinators, tree planting, community garden projects, youth education, and speakers at our Convention.

In 2023, using proceeds from the draws, the OHA allocated \$11,075 to support Keeping Ontario Beautiful® through grants. Additionally, the organization awarded prize winnings to four individuals in Ontario: \$5,670 (March 16), \$3,682.50 (July 21), \$1,550 (September 16), and \$3,197.50 (December 16).

OHA GRANTS PROGRAM IMPACTING COMMUNITIES

Revitalization of Martintown Community Centre Grounds

The Ontario Horticultural Association, also known as GardenOntario, strives to make funds available through the awards and grants program, to assist societies in completing projects of benefit to their communities. This is one of the projects that was assisted.

In 2009, the Martintown Community Centre opened its doors for the first time. The Martintown and District Horticultural Society has been involved with preparing, planting and maintaining the flower beds on the South and East sides of the building since it was opened.

After fourteen years, many of the plants were ready to be replaced. The winter of 2022 was extremely harsh in the area. January brought a month of endless cold high winds from the north that damaged many shrubs. In April of 2023, an ice storm damaged the remaining shrubs and an evergreen that were trying desperately to hang on. As a result, fifteen shrubs had to be removed including six



yews, three boxwoods and six barberries. An evergreen also had to be removed.



In the Spring of 2023, after the ice storm, a clean-up of the grounds was completed and the damaged shrubs were removed. This provided a perfect opportunity to replace the shrubs with native, pollinator friendly plants. It was important to the society to ensure that the replacements would last and would provide shelter and food for birds, bees and insects.

The choice of plants was based on five criteria which included being native as much as possible, being low maintenance, having a variety of colour and texture, having continuous bloom throughout the season and attracting pollinators.

A professional watering system is available at the Centre that provides water automatically depending on weather conditions. This ensures that the plants will receive the best care possible even on the hottest days.

Following the planting, a thick layer of natural mulch was placed on all the beds. The Society also has a maintenance plan in place by way of a roster. One member is responsible for weeding, trimming and dead heading per week from May until mid-October.



The winter of 2023/2024 was very mild with just enough snow to protect the new plants from the wind that is constant at the Community Centre. It looks like all the plants planted in the spring/summer of 2023 are thriving and will provide a lovely spectacle this summer.







An important component of the gardens at the Community Centre is the education of the public to the benefits of native and pollinator plants. The Martintown Community Centre is the most used building in South Glengarry Township. Activities go on morning, afternoon, and evenings five days a week with family gatherings, showers and meetings on most weekends. It is a perfect place to promote our gardens. Not only can the plants be admired growing in the flower beds, but we are preparing a large graphic for the bulletin board in the lobby. The design will include pictures of all the plants in the positions they are growing in the gardens with their names, a brief description, and growing habits. This part of the project will be implemented this summer.



The Martintown and District Horticultural Society is grateful to the OHA for the funding to be able to complete this project and provide a native habitat to the creatures that call this area home.



COMMUNICATIONS

Several tools are used to communicate within the OHA to keep in touch with our affiliated Societies/Clubs and to increase our exposure within the general population.

 The OHA website, www.GardenOntario.org continues to be our major source of communications and transmission of information with Social Media now used to communicate information out as well.



- In 2023, the OHA and its Districts continued to use virtual means to communicate with Societies/Clubs such as Zoom, WebEx and Microsoft Teams as well as the resumption of in person meetings.
- The quarterly publication, the *Trillium*, is emailed to a majority of affiliated Societies/Clubs and donors. All issues of the *Trillium* are posted on the www.GardenOntario.org home page. Past issues are archived on the website.
- Many District Directors generate their own newsletters and communicate important information to the Societies and general membership. All affiliated Societies/Clubs have access to OHA material for distribution.
- The OHA offers promotional items to Districts, affiliated Societies/Clubs and members through the virtual Garden Shop and through the GardenOntario Vista Print Store where items such as Pins, Certificates, T-shirts, Sweaters, Mugs, Hasty Note Cards, the Ontario Judging and Exhibiting Standards booklet and a variety of free promotional materials are made available.
- Publicity and promotional pieces are developed and circulated to various locations and are available at our outreach events.
- Normally, the Annual Convention of the Ontario Horticultural Association includes the Annual General Meeting of the organization. At this meeting, affiliated Societies/Clubs receive necessary financial and business reports. Election of the Officers for the coming year takes place. Networking, attending workshops and speaker sessions, as well as fostering social interaction are just some of the important benefits of attending the Annual General Meeting of the OHA. In 2023, the OHA AGM was held in District 2 in the Ottawa area.
- The Ontario Horticultural Association Officers and Board Members met four times last year
 via virtual means using WebEx technology, teleconference calls and in person. Decisions
