Ben Earle – Feed Durham Project:

Building Community Resilience Through Local Food Innovation

Ben is a systems-focused nonprofit leader dedicated to strengthening food security and reducing poverty through practical, community-driven solutions. As President and CEO of Feed the Need in Durham, he leads a regional network supporting thousands of people each month while helping partners build capacity and navigate complex operational and social challenges.

Ben also serves as the Chair of the Region of Durham's Poverty Response Action Committee, guiding collaborative strategies that address the structural drivers of poverty. Nationally, Ben contributes to policy development as a Director with Basic Income Canada Network, advancing evidence-informed approaches to income security.

Rooted in a background of policy analysis, applied research, and program design, Ben is known for translating complexity into clear, actionable strategies that centre dignity, equity, and long-term community resilience.

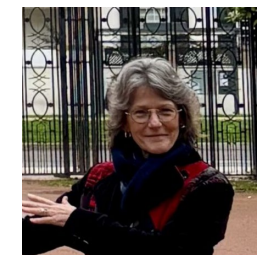
Homegrown Conservation: Transforming Gardens into Resilient Wildlife Habitat – Thomas Luloff

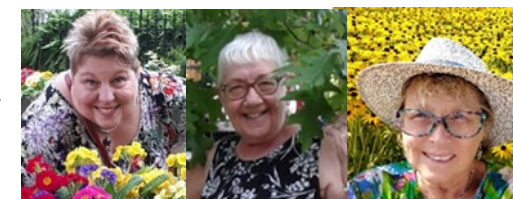
The Blossom Trail – Sarah Cowley

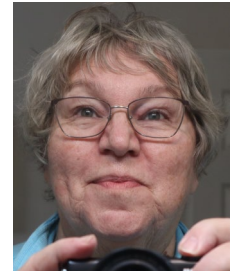
From the Vegetable Patch to the Show Table - Judges' Update #2 – Ken Brown

Urban Farming in Schools and Non-Profit Neighbourhoods - “We Grow Food Edible Garden Project”

Carol Vandersanden and Michelle Perry

We Grow Food was founded in 2013 by Carol who is a chef and urban gardener. Two years later, she was joined by Michelle who has a background as a child and youth worker and is now the Director of Operations and a facilitator for We Grow Food.

With over 125 gardens throughout Durham Region, We Grow Food is providing hands on experiential learning, installing edible gardens and educational workshops to support the growing of food within their communities.



Botanical Drawing Workshop

Botanical Drawing – Bert Liverance *Please Note Registration is required for this **two-session** workshop and there is a \$20 kit fee, payable upon registration. This workshop is limited to 50 people.*

Bert Liverance is an award-winning artist who has trained world-wide. He has been recognized by the McMichael Gallery among many others and has designed floral coins for the Royal Canadian Mint. Bert creates floral paintings so alive, you think you can smell them. His work has been featured in publications, galleries and juried exhibitions throughout North America, and his paintings are in museums, embassies, public and private collections around the world.

Bert will lead the participants through four different drawing exercises using pencil to help the participants understand form, light and texture, while learning about light vs. shadow, proportion, edge and tone. The second half of the presentation will use watercolour to see light and colour through exercises and a final project. A description of the exercises will be provided to the registrants. All materials required will be supplied in the kit.

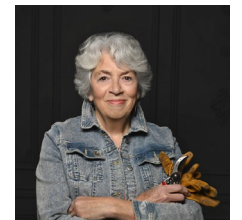
Attracting Wild Birds to Your Garden – Paul Oliver

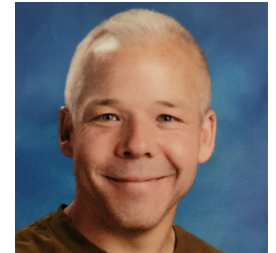
Building Biodiversity with Native Plants – Paul LaPorte

Paul LaPorte is the owner of the Ephemeral Ark Nursery, where he specializes in the propagation of native woodland species. He currently serves as Chair of the Ontario Native Plant Growers Association, is a member of the Ontario Biodiversity Council, and is an active contributor to the Southern Ontario Seed Strategy. He consults regularly with municipalities, non-governmental organizations, land trusts and horticultural associations on invasive species management, ethical seed collection/propagation and establishment of orchards, all to build biodiversity with native plants.



G.L. Roberts CVI Horticultural Program and Pelargoniums – William Grainger

William Grainger attended U of T, initially headed towards a career in medicine or research in infectious diseases. After taking a detour into teaching, he decided that his heart was helping teenagers learn biology, horticulture and life skills in general. He created courses in horticulture before the government had even begun penning the “Green Industries” curriculum. Over the years William has hosted gardening radio shows, spoken widely on pelargoniums and even created his own TV show “Growing with Grainger”. He grew pelargoniums in his teens but began obsessively collecting them about 15 years ago. He has hybridized dozens of new varieties some of which can be found around the globe.



Vermicomposting– Ryan Vieira, Little Worm Farm

Ryan Vieira is the owner of Our Little Worm Farm, a small vermicomposting operation based in the Kawartha Lakes region of Ontario. He collects spent coffee grounds and other organic materials from local businesses and processes them using composting worms to produce nutrient-rich worm castings. Ryan sells his compost and worms at local farmers' markets plant sales and events organized by horticultural societies. He also provides information and practical guidance to help others get started with vermicomposting at home.
