Our Executive and Directors met in mid- October for our regular fall Board meeting in Innisfil to share our progress to date on various committees and initiatives, address issues of interest to the OHA and to do some strategic planning. Your Board takes their responsibilities to advocate on your behalf very seriously so you can imagine how lively and productive our discussions are.

Here is a brief synopsis of our Fall Board Meeting Highlights.

- GardenOntario Week will take place from June 10-18, 2017. The Board feels that this initiative serves to inspire our societies and partnering organizations to join in and share their knowledge and love of gardening in their communities across our province. Events can be publicized on our website www.gardenontarioweek.org. This year we are providing some promotional resources. Check out our fill-in poster that societies can use to advertise their specific events as well as our template for labels that can be used on seed envelopes, welcome bags and other items to advertise what you plan to do this June to promote your love of gardening. Be sure to spread the word!
- Have you heard about the new OHA Pollinator Initiative? The OHA is taking the lead in spearheading a project to create and promote pollinator friendly gardens and nesting sites in all 19 Districts. The Conservation & Environment Committee is working on a new pollinator booklet to assist gardeners and our organization is collaborating with many like-minded organizations to create a pollinator garden at Queen's Park in Toronto. We hope that many societies & Districts will use GardenOntario Week to showcase their efforts and educate the general public about the importance of supporting our pollinators. Everyone can make a difference.
- Two new Honorarium positions are being created for 2017. The Board has voted to offer a \$1500 honorarium for the position of OHA Web Administrator and a \$1500 Honorarium for an OHA Communications Coordinator. Job descriptions and a call for interested applicants will be circulated via email and website shortly so if you are interested in sharing your talents and skills in either of these two positions, please contact the OHA Secretary.
- District 5 is hosting our forthcoming Convention July 21-23 in York Region. Cindy Scythes and her District will be posting information about guest speakers, workshops, bus trips and vendors as soon as details are finalized. Be sure to add these dates to your calendar.
- Support this year's two fundraisers: License Plate Frames & OHA 18 Month Calendars. The OHA Fundraising Committee reminded everyone that it is not too late to order these wonderful items. Frames are \$10 each and the beautiful calendars that feature gardens across the province sell for \$20 each. Celebrating Canada's 150th in Assiginack

In celebration of Canada's sesquicentennial in 2017, Assiginack Horticultural Society was the lucky recipient of one of 150 of the "150th Celebration Gardens" distributed across Canada by the Canadian Garden Council in collaboration with Veseys Bulbs of PEI. Consisting of 1,000 tulip bulbs, an international symbol of friendship and an enduring symbol of our national ethos of kindness and hospitality, the 150th Celebration Garden is a terrific way to say "Happy Birth" to Our Home and Native Land.

As a Co-President, May Mervyn noted that the Society feels very fortunate to have received one of these Gardens since the Canadian Garden Council, the organization behind the 150th Celebration Garden program, received more than 400 applications. The public planting ceremony for the garden, which consists of 500 red and 500 white tulip bulbs planted in the shape of the maple leaf on the Canadian flag, took place on October 14th, in front of the Assiginack Public Library. Everyone, from seniors to school children, the Mayor, the local MPP, and the public was in attendance at the planting ceremony as the community makes its preparations to celebrate Canada's 150th birthday next year.

The garden, and the other 149 gardens planted across the country, is symbolically linked to a Flagship 150th Celebration Garden Promenade, consisting of 25,000 tulips also donated by Veseys, adjacent to Niagara Falls, one of Canada's largest gateways for visitors to our country.

It all began with an OHA grant to the Sprouts. Our group already has planted trees, built a pollinating garden, and has built and maintains a public garden. We were not sure if we wanted another garden to maintain. The leaders all agreed we wanted to do something that would have an impact on the youth in Ennismore. On CBC there was a topic about a Buddy Bench. This is something that has taken off across Canada. These special benches are placed in the school playground. It is a place for a child to sit if they have a problem, such as:

- can't resolve a conflict with their friends
- friends are not at school today
- want to play a different game than their friends
- being bullied

This sounded like something the Sprouts would be proud to be a part of. We meet in Ennismore, so of course, the school would be St. Martins Separate School in the Hamlet of Ennismore. The principal was very excited that we would be willing to raise money to donate the bench to the school.

Over the course of 10 months, the Sprouts raised money by having bake sales and bottle drives and sold fire starters. We also had many private donations to help reach our goal. On the first day of school in September, the bench was delivered to the school. The principal was in shock. He couldn't believe we actually came through and raised enough money to purchase the bench. In November there was the official unveiling of the bench. School dignitaries, members of the Ennismore Horticultural Society and, of course Ennismore Sprouts who attended this school were present. Scott Gardiner (pictured at right), one of the leaders for Sprouts spoke about how we decided on this project and how we raised the money. It was a very proud day for Ennismore Sprouts.

We have 16 Sprouts, four of them attend St. Martins School, and the rest attend Chemong Public School in Bridgenorth. So here we go again. We are fundraising to purchase another buddy bench at that school now. The cost of the bench which is made out of recycled plastic, is \$800.



We are excited about this project and we have had wonderful community support.

October 1st, 2016 was the perfect day to hold OHA District 9's Fall Forum. The leaves were starting to turn and fall was certainly in the air. The inside of Grace Mennonite Church Hall was decorated with wayside flowers and material which formed the centerpieces of the tables. A beautiful backdrop for a wonderful day.

Sweets Café & Crepes catered our brunch, which was a great success. The variety and quality of the prepared foods was well received, leaving the audience well-fed, relaxed and ready to listen to the welcome extended by Sue Lusted and the representatives of both host cities, St. Catharines and Thorold.

Finally, what we were all awaiting, our energetic well-known garden guru Mr. Paul Zammit, the Director of Horticulture at the Toronto Botanical Garden, took centre stage.

His chosen topic, Creating Biodiversity in the Home Garden, is a favourite subject of his. "It's a matter of making choices. (Today) people are thinking about the usefulness of the garden – making every plant count."

He said some of the old ways of gardening are declining. Instead of cleaning up every fallen leaf, dead stalk and dying annual in the fall, people are now leaving them to nourish the soil and help feed the birds over winter. "It's a change

of perception. It supports biodiversity. Clover used to be terrible in the lawn. But bees love it, so leave it in."

He explained how you can plant many vegetables and herbs, with flowers, something not always thought of for small spaces. Plants like rosemary, parsley, basil, chard, eggplant, peppers and violas, look lovely but have another purpose as well.

"We're pushing gardens for wellness," Zammit said. "It brings it full circle – it's good for the garden, good for creatures and good for us. It's an opportunity to do our bit of stewardship. Before it was all about aesthetics. Now gardeners want to know what they can do and change."



Well received, topical and important, his message was delivered to a receptive audience who, I'm certain, took notes and will follow his valuable advice.

The flower show was gorgeous and many amazing entries got the attention of the crowd of more than 75 eager gardeners. Prizes and raffles meant many left with more than they came with.

A fantastic day was had by all.

OHA Nominations

The election of the Ontario Horticultural Association President, as well as the Vice President, is an important part of the Annual Convention. Usually, there is a normal progression into the President's chair. It is essential to have continuity in the flow of these offices. 




North York - A Busy Summer

In September, we hosted our Annual Flower and Vegetable Show. Despite a very dry summer there were 214 entries throughout 5 different classes and 88 categories.



Lindsay Tree Planting & Dedication

The two Past Presidents who were unable to attend were: Edna Spence and Marjorie Lafreniere. Along with the Past Presidents and their family members, our local Board members were in attendance. As well, four members of our District 4 OHA were able to be present, as well as some Victoria Manor residents.

After the dedication ceremony outside, we headed indoors for a wonderful luncheon prepared by Lamentia Grocers in Lindsay. This was enjoyed by all. Centrepieces for the tables for this event were made by Lucille Rathwell and Lena Wilms.

Annual Awards

The Ontario Horticultural Association sponsors a number of awards that are presented annually during the annual convention. Each Society should have an Awards Booklet available to inform the members of the awards available and the procedure to follow to place a nomination. This information is also on the website (www.gardenontario.org/ act/awa.php) for downloading by societies.

Awards presented at the convention are:

- Silver Medal Award
- Trillium Award
- Silver Fir Award
- Award of Merit
- Community Improvement Award
- Environmental Award
- Youth Leader
- Honour Roll
- Youth Project Award

Plant a Tree

The OHA is continuing its Tree-Planting Grant, whereby a Society or District may apply for up to \$200 for a special tree-planting. Up to 25 of these grants will be awarded in 2017.

The grant is to be used for the purchase of a tree to be planted in a community or public space. A request outlining the species of tree to be purchased, where the tree will be planted, and whether the planting commemorates a special event for the Society/District/Community should be sent to the OHA Awards Coordinator at the address given above. The Tree-Planting Grants will be awarded on a first-come basis after December 31, 2016, up to a maximum of 25 awards per year. Any Society or District that receives this funding cannot apply again for three years. The awarded Society or District must complete the planting of their tree by the end of that given year. For example, if the grant is awarded in 2017, the tree must be planted by the end of 2017.

Once approved, payment is made upon submission of an original receipt for the tree and a digital photo of the planting. The photo becomes the property of the OHA. Nominations, with supporting information, should be sent to:

The deadline for receipt of nominations is February 28, 2017. The Awards Coordinator will forward the nominations to the OHA Awards Committee for selection of the winning recipients. The Awards Committee is composed of the President (Chair of the Committee), Vice President, Past President, Treasurer, Secretary, Awards Coordinator, and the Chair of the Past President's Council. Any decision of the Committee will be considered as a decision of the Board of Directors.

Please give serious consideration to selecting people who would be worthy recipients of these prestigious awards.

Begin a Special Project

As part of the ongoing support of member Societies, the OHA annually awards Special Project grants of up to \$500 each for the use of Societies toward the completion of projects that have a long lasting benefit to their Society or community. The grant is to be used for planting materials such as perennials, trees and shrubs, and not for the planting of annuals or for mulch, manure, compost or hard surface materials. When preparing your application, be sure to include information about the location and use of the project, a budget for the project, a planting plan, one or two photographs of the site, a list of plant materials to be used, and the estimated costs. Please keep your applications to a maximum of 6 pages.

Grants will be given for up to ten projects a year, with a limit of one project per Society per year. Any Society that receives this funding cannot apply again for five years.

To be considered for a Special Project grant in 2017, an application form and the accompanying information should be completed and mailed to your District Director no later than February 28, 2017. Application forms are available on the OHA website at www.gardenontario.org/act/awa.php or from your District Director.

Community Gardens

The Ontario Horticultural Association encourages its member societies to create or contribute to community gardens whether urban or rural. OHA will award a grant of \$500 each to two societies to assist in the funding of a new community garden or the upgrading of an existing community garden.

A community garden is a plot of land, either publicly or privately owned, that is used to grow food for gardeners and/or the surrounding community. Either the whole space is communal or each member maintains a plot. Members share in the upkeep of the garden (work bees) and are encouraged to participate in the decision-making process and socialize with other gardeners.

Eligible expenses include costs related to site development such as the construction of raised beds, as well as soil, tools, and equipment purchases. Upgrading a garden may take the form of adding a washroom, a compost area, a water harvesting area, fencing or other installations that support the gardening activities of the members.

When completing your application, please include information about permissions to build a garden on your site, insurance waivers for participants, a budget, a plan of your project, and any partners in your project.

To apply, complete the Community Garden application form and mail it to your Director no later than February 28 of the current year. If your community garden project is awarded a grant, payment will follow a completion report including receipts and pictures of the completed project.

There is a time limit on the issuing of the grant. The completion report must be received by the OHA Awards Coordinator before December 31 of the following year. For example, the completion report for a grant awarded in 2017 must be received by December 31, 2018. If a the report, accompanied by receipts, is not received by that time, it will be assumed that the community garden project will not be completed and the grant will be cancelled.

Seedy Saturday/Sunday Grants

The Ontario Horticultural Association provides two (2) grants of \$250 annually to its member Societies to organize a firsttime Seedy Saturday/Sunday event in their communities. It is hoped that such support will promote seed saving and the exchange of regionally adapted, bio-diverse seed in Ontario for the purposes of promoting seed-saving and seed exchange in Ontario. This event may be held any day of the week.

Seedy Saturdays/Sundays bring together gardeners, farmers, seed savers, and citizens passionate about gardening, food security, and the environment.

These one-day non-profit public events often feature speakers and workshops, vendors, youth activities, and seed exchanges and sales.

Eligible event expenses include costs related to the rental of venue, tables and chairs, speaker fees, signage, and promotional material.

When completing the application, please provide a detailed budget breakdown of how the funds will be used.

Complete the Seedy Saturday/Sunday application form, found on the gardenontario.org website and mail it to the Awards Coordinator NO LATER THAN NOVEMBER 15TH of the year preceding the Seedy Saturday/Sunday event.

If your Seedy Saturday/Sunday event is awarded a grant, payment will be made in January of the year of the event.

Note that recipients of this award can receive the award only once.



2017 Convention Competitions: Overview and Schedules now posted

For the 2017 OHA Convention, the OHA Competitions Committee has continued to revise the rules and regulations to harmonize across the adult and youth schedules as much as possible.

The competition schedules (except Publications) are inspired by the convention theme "*Green from Shore to Shore*" and are linked through the class title "*Perfect Partners*" as a means to explore creative expression and to stimulate viewing interest. Competitions are open to adult and youth members, Societies and Districts in good standing with the Ontario Horticultural Association. The submission of an entry implies that the exhibitor gives consent to the OHA to make further use of the entry in any way that the OHA designates. Ownership of the content is retained by the exhibitor.

Important entry deadlines are *May* 1 (Photography, Publications), *June* 1 (Art, Creative Writing, Youth, some classes in the Flower Show) and at the Convention (Art, Flower Show, Youth). Judging criteria are outlined in each competition schedule, Judges may withhold an award if, in their opinion, the exhibit is not worthy. The decision of the judges is final.

Awards vary among competitions but all include OHA placement ribbons and cash prizes and rosettes and a \$20

cash prize donated by the District 5 Executive for Best in Show and Judge's Choice. The \$100 award to the Society with the highest point aggregate in the adult competitions will continue again in 2017 but is based on a revised scoring scheme to encourage entries: 1st (5 points), 2nd (4), 3rd (3), Honourable Mention (2), Entry (1), Best in Show (5) and Judges Choice (5). So we look forward to lots of entries! But please note, given the Society award, an exhibitor is requested to enter with only one Society affiliation across all adult competitions.

No removal of entries is permitted until after the competitions are closed on Saturday. Entries and prizes are to be picked up Sunday morning or, if necessary, by special arrangement with the Competition Coordinator(s). A signature is necessary for receipt of materials. Materials from the photography and creative writing competitions will be sent to the exhibitor by mail only if a stamped, self-addressed envelope is included with the entry.

An overview and full details of the competitions rules & regulations are posted on-line (via a link on the gardenontario home page), along with the schedules for each competition separately in conjunction with this issue of the Trillium.

Clearing up the Confusion

One of the best means that an organization has for making itself visible and recognizable is its logo. Whether it's the Nike swoosh or the golden arches of McDonald's, the logo instantly identifies the product.

Admittedly, the OHA's logo isn't quite as well-known as those of Nike or McDonald's. But it's familiar to most hort society members, and, we hope, to many of the people that we work with.

The use of the trillium as our logo began over 75 years ago, following the OHA's role in making it the provincial emblem. It was in the early 1980s that we began to use that stylized version that you see on the front of the Trillium. We also trademarked it at that time. But sometime around the year 2000, another version appeared. It's similar, but it's noticeably different. What's also noticeable is that its use has become more widespread over the past few years.

To avoid inconsistency and a confusing mix of the two images, you're asked to use the official version, which can be found on the gardenontario website at the bottom of this page: http://www.gardenontario.org/abo/forms. php. On that page, it's available in black, "OHA green", and white (for use on top of other images). There are two choices of formats, jpeg (the most commonly used) and png. If you need it in another format (eps, wmf, etc.) send me an email (history@gardenontario.org), and I'll make sure that you get it.

And if you're wondering what the difference is between the two here they are, the correct version on the left, and the incorrect one on the right.
